BEING A DISCIPLE OF CHRIST: BIBLICAL MODELS OF CHRISTIAN DISCIPLESHIP IN THE NEW TESTAMENT

Thursdays, April 7 & April 14, 7-8:00 p.m.

There is no shortage of books on Christian discipleship. While most texts describe the initial objective as becoming a follower of Christ, each book offers a unique set of methods to achieve this goal. Some offer techniques that include Bible study and major changes to personal and corporate behavior, while other approaches appear more introspective and contemplative. Why must there be so many different approaches? One might be tempted to say, "Just live the way the disciples did in the New Testament," and leave it at that. But such a declaration is more complex than one might initially believe.

When we look at how particular groups of disciples followed Jesus Christ, we discover many different methods within the sacred text. It appears that even during the earliest period of Christian history, there was not a single means by which to follow Christ. Throughout this Lenten study, participants will investigate key texts of the New Testament, revealing many methods by which disciples functioned as followers or pupils, and ask how applicable these methods might be for thoughtful Christians of our day.

The Great Vigil of Easter is the service that ushers in Easter. It is a service of great drama and movement. The Vigil begins outside. As we gather in the dark, the Great Fire of Easter is lit. The Paschal Candle is lit from the fire, as are the congregations candles, and we process together into the church. The church remains dark for the Liturgy of the Word. We hear together the story of God's redeeming work done on our behalf. Between the readings, we will have responses that include music, movement, and ritual. Reminded of salvation history, we reaffirm our baptismal vows together, recalling that we, too, are a part of God's salvation story. Now it is time to declare that Christ is Risen! The Great Alleluia is then proclaimed, the lights are thrown on. We are the people of God prepared to participate in a Resurrected reality, in which death and darkness have been conquered. As the Body of Christ, we are now fed with the Body of Christ, as the service culminates with The Great Thanksgiving, Holy Eucharist. We are sent forth to be a people set free by Christ to be Christ for this broken world. Won't you be a part of this service draped in Holy Mystery, **Saturday, April 23rd** Gather in the courtyard **at sundown**.

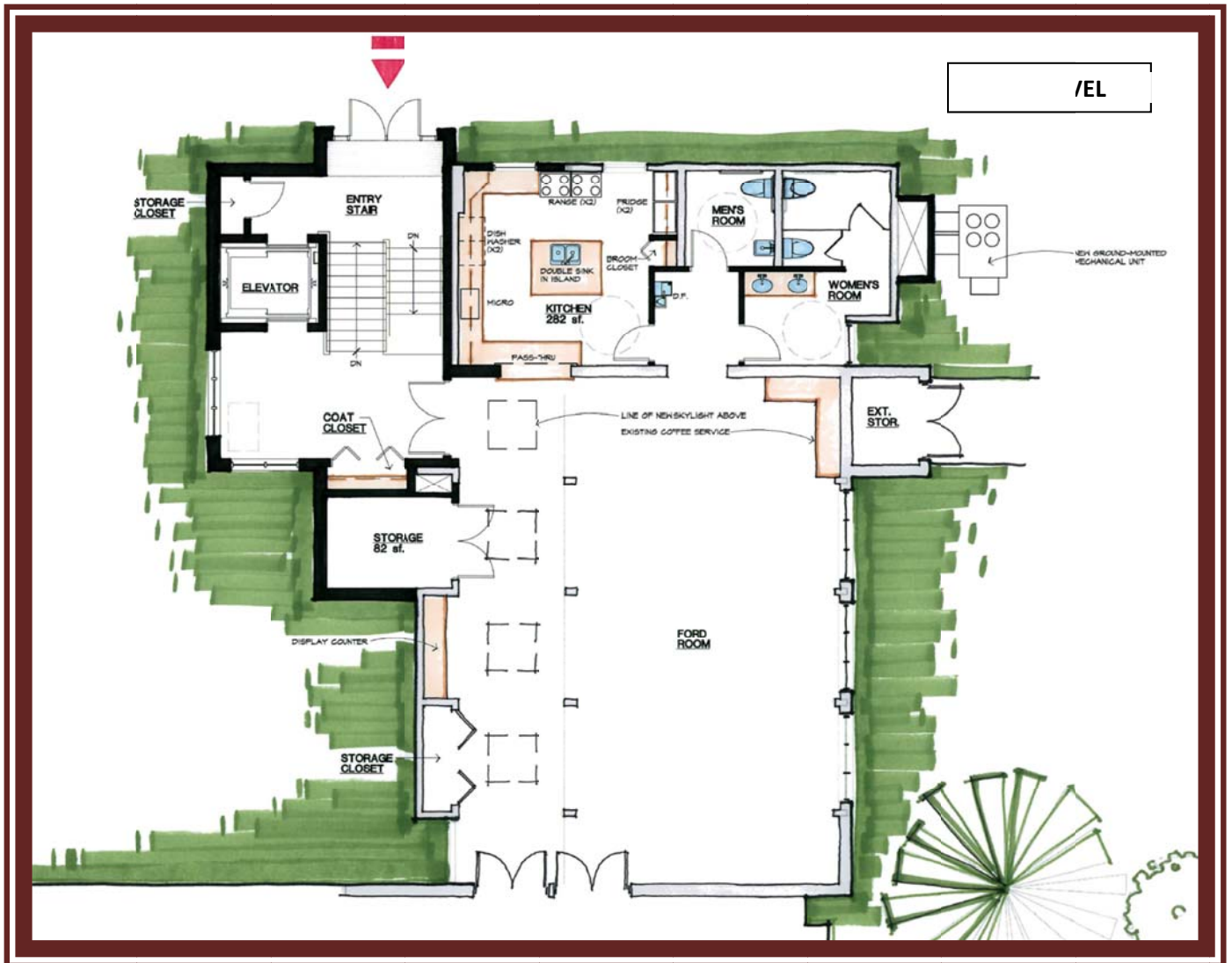


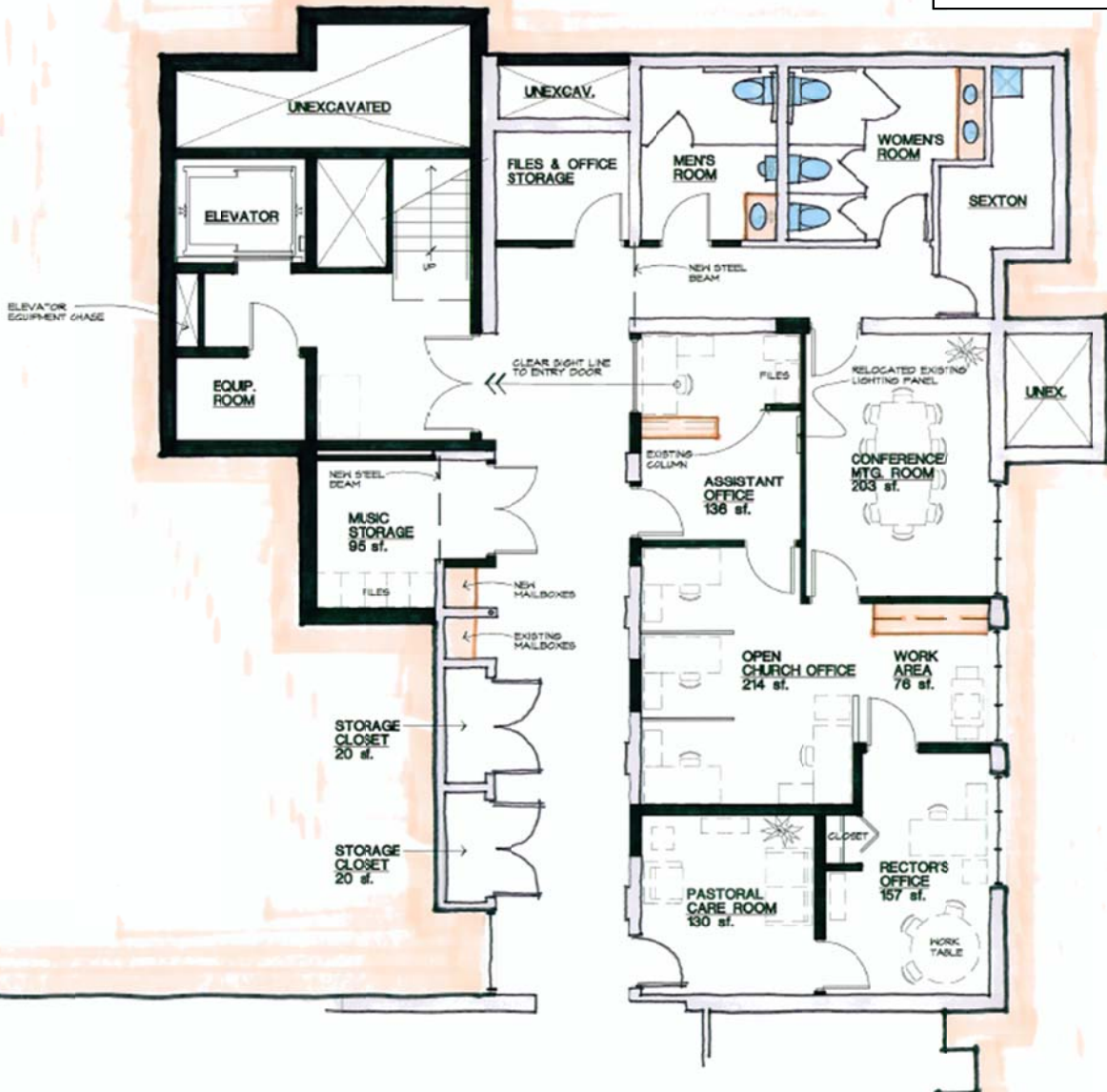

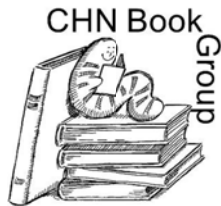

Here is a review of the book from Amazon.com: *The Return of the Prodigal Son: A Story of Homecoming* is a spiritual adventure story. A chance encounter with a poster depicting a detail of Rembrandt's *The Return of the Prodigal Son* set in motion a chain of events that enabled Nouwen to redefine and claim his vocation late in his life. In this book, which interweaves elements of art history, memoir, Midrash, and self-help, Nouwen brings the parable to life with empathic analyses of each character. Nouwen's absorption in the story (and the painting) is so complete that the father's challenge to love the son, and the son's challenge to receive that love, become Nouwen's own. And Nouwen's writing is so clear and his tone is so appealingly frank and humble that readers--no matter how far from home--will find hope for themselves in the prodigal peace Nouwen ultimately achieves. --Michael Joseph Gross (Amazon.com review)

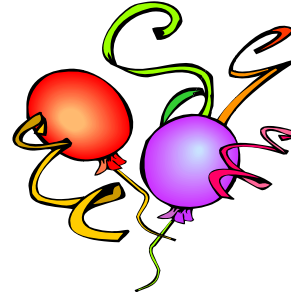
